

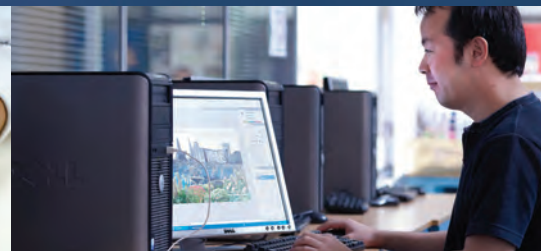

My Writtle College

I chose to read Animal Science at Writtle College because I had an interest in biology and also in working with animals. The degree allowed me to pursue both of my interests. In addition the degree encompassed a wide range of modules ranging from ecology to cell biology and thus offered me a wide range of subjects. It is this wide range of subjects that I really enjoyed at Writtle, in particular the more scientific modules such as Cell Biology and Function. In addition I enjoyed the balance of practical and theory based learning. Finally it should be noted that the lecturers and the facilities (e.g. the library) also made completing the degree an enjoyable and exciting experience. In terms of student memories of College, I remember living on campus in halls and the food at the on-site restaurant, both gave me my first taste of what it was like to live away from home. Beyond that I can recall the many social events that were held at the BAA – the on-site bar.

My career path

Since I started studying for my GCSEs, many years prior to Writtle, I had begun working at a local Animal Rescue charity. This charity took in all kinds of animals from dogs and cats to horses and sheep. It started my interest in working with animals and I continued working there until the final year of my degree at Writtle. Beyond that I have completed various work experiences at local veterinary surgeries and also at the Broxbourne Wildlife Park Zoo. During my time at Writtle I completed a module entitled Animal Health and Disease. This module sparked my interest in viruses. Upon completion of my degree I decided to pursue this interest and studied for an MSc in Medical Microbiology (with an emphasis on molecular virology) at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. Following this I took a year out working in industry before starting a PhD in Virology. While the subject of my degree is not directly related to that of my MSc and PhD it did provide me with the necessary scientific background to undertake these fields.

My current job

My current job is a postgraduate student studying for a doctorate in Virology at the National Institute for Biological Standards and Control and Imperial College London. My work is based on improving the current inactivated poliovirus vaccine for the Endgame phase of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. I particularly enjoy the research aspect of this work. Much of my research is cutting edge and never been done before and thus is quite exciting! I also enjoy the knowledge that my research is contributing to improving the vaccine used to control and eradicate poliovirus.

Future plans

My immediate future plans are to finish writing my thesis and complete my doctorate. Following that I intend to seek out a postdoctoral position in either academia or industry. I intend to continue my research into developing and improving vaccines.

My career path

Undertaking this course was part of a complete career change for me. I decided to change from being a Sales Manager to train to become an Equine and Canine Body Worker, and this led me onto the Sports Therapy course at Writtle College.

After completing my Equine Body Workers Certificate with Equinenergy – who hold courses at Writtle College – I realised that I needed to know more about horse anatomy, nutrition, behaviour, biomechanics and the rider's influence, as well as complementary therapies, so I enrolled onto the Equine Sports Therapy Course.

I worked part-time in my own business, Woof Neigh Therapy while studying for my BSc and I have found that since graduating, vets are more willing to refer horses and dogs to me for massage and physio.

My current job

I love my current job working with dogs and horses. I address their musculoskeletal issues and assess gait patterns and biomechanics. Afterwards I decide on a treatment plan and carry it out, later assessing the improvement in the horse or dog. I've now been able to combine my all consuming passion for animals with a satisfying career. My life is hardly recognisable to pre-Writtle!

When I consider the downsides, I realise that there really are not many...but I do work seven days a week and haven't taken a holiday this year. Running and building your own business is not necessarily an easy option but I really enjoy the challenge and love working for myself.

Future plans

I am continuing in education while running my own business, Woof Neigh Therapy. I am enrolled as a part-time student in Shropshire, now studying for an MSc in Veterinary Physiotherapy. After two years on this course I will achieve a Postgraduate Diploma in Veterinary Physiotherapy which qualifies me to call myself a Veterinary Physiotherapist. I intend to continue for another year to complete a dissertation to obtain my MSc.

Although it was hard work I thoroughly enjoyed my three years at Writtle and as well as achieving my dream of working in conservation I have also gained lifelong friends.

My career path

I had no previous work experience just an interest in the natural environment and an enjoyment of being outdoors. This course enabled me to make a complete career change having previously been a 'desk job' Civil Servant.

I gained employment with the Council in 2009 as a temporary Landscape Assistant leading practical volunteer work parties. I was then fortunate to secure promotion and a permanent position as the Community Landscape Officer 10 months later.

My degree course gave me the theoretical knowledge that I am now able to apply in the workplace. I have found that the most useful modules were the practical ones such as ecological surveying techniques, and habitat management evaluation as I regularly survey and assess different habitats and write management plans.

My current job

My current role seeks to improve council owned public open green space for both people and wildlife. This is delivered through my work with community groups, volunteers and schools in leading practical activities, advising on suitable management, seeking funding opportunities and looking for opportunities to increase biodiversity through habitat creation and management.

My Writtle College

Writtle College has an excellent reputation which I had heard about long before deciding where to study. The location of the College was also a deciding factor because I was able to commute each day. Having an existing job and a young family I was not keen to move away.

I had a very interesting and extremely rewarding student experience as I gained a great deal of knowledge and insight into a subject that I was passionate about. I also met some very like-minded people that were both enthusiastic and supportive during my years at Writtle – this all helped to create an engaging environment in which to study.

I particularly enjoyed the campus and grounds at the College as they are ideal for studying conservation and land management with a variety of habitats and land usages.

My career path

Prior to my degree I completed the NVQ 2 in Environmental Conservation at Writtle. As a mature student this was an excellent introduction to College life whilst acquiring important practical skills. Prior to, and during, my time at Writtle I had an active interest in ornithology and species conservation. I volunteered for a variety of conservation charities doing

practical land and habitat management. Throughout my course, I was a BTO Wetland Bird Survey (WeBS) recorder, and also carried a number of other surveys including butterfly monitoring and breeding bird surveys. Volunteering experience along with the knowledge and skills I learnt during my time at Writtle College enabled me to move straight into paid employment in the conservation and habitat management sector.

I secured a reserves warden position with the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB) two months prior to the completion of my course. Initially The RSPB allowed me to work part time to enable me to complete my studies, I then moved into the full time position, once graduated.

During my role as warden at the RSPB South Essex Marshes I obtained valuable experience in machinery operation, species surveying, habitat management and creation and contract management. Knowledge of many of these tasks was underpinned by the skills and knowledge I had gained at Writtle College.

My current job

My new role as site manager is extremely varied, allowing me to have a great deal of input and influence in the design, management and creation of a landscape scale wetland nature reserve. The South Essex Marshes is one of the largest projects of its kind in the country at over 1,000 hectares. Managing staff and contractors, management plan writing, habitat creation, engaging with key stakeholders and partners are all part of my role of site manager. Working with farmers is key in the management of habitats for wildlife and one of the many interesting aspects of working with the RSPB.

There are no downsides to my job, every day is a challenge, very different and very rewarding.

I have always been interested in farming and worked on our family farm at every opportunity in the holidays and Writtle seemed the perfect step after finishing school for me.

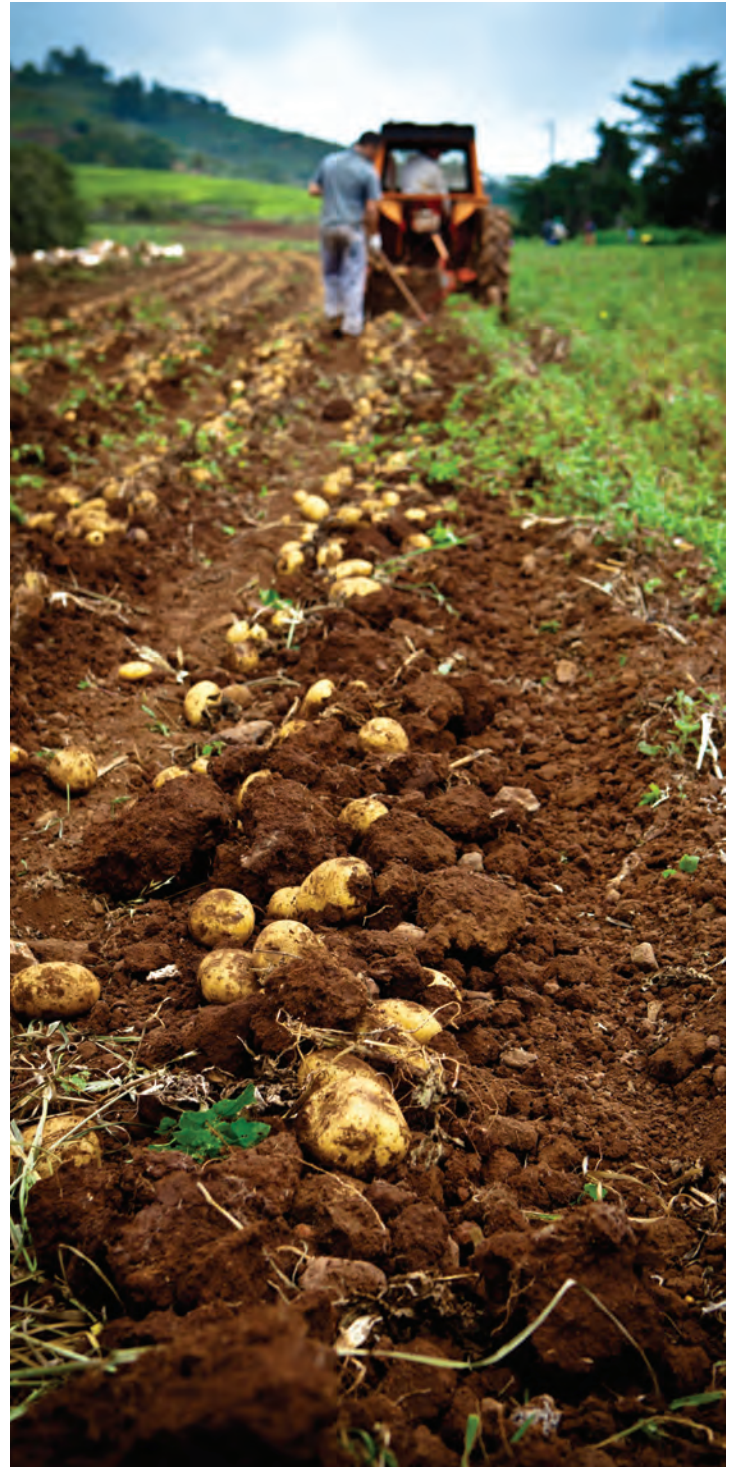

My Writtle College

The BSc (Hons) Equine Studies appeared to be the most varied of the courses available at the time. Although I had a keen interest in nutrition when choosing my course, I was aware of the difficulty in finding employment in this area and therefore wanted the option to study a variety of subjects in order to widen employment opportunities when I graduated.

I chose career development as one of my College modules which required me to use the careers service to a large extent, which I found very useful. As part of this module I was able to investigate the equine nutrition industry further which again strengthened my contacts in this field.

I really enjoyed my time at Writtle College and made some great friends who have remained close even after finishing College.

My career path

Having worked at a couple of different yards throughout my time studying at Writtle College I carried on with this more practical line of work through the summer after finishing College and whilst keeping an eye out for employment within other areas of the equine industry – namely nutrition. In the September I sent out speculative letters and my CV to a couple of Feed Companies in my area before heading off on holiday. It was while I was in Thailand that the Director of Nutrition at Baileys Horse Feeds contacted me to inform me of the vacancy of Equine Nutritionist that had arisen within the company. The advert was to appear in Horse and Hound the following week. On my return home I looked at the advert and promptly emailed confirmation of my interest in the role. After two interviews, a presentation and 50 written questions to answer, I secured the role of Equine Nutritionist at Baileys Horse Feeds and commenced employment in January 2008.

Without my degree I would not have even been considered for the job I do now. Although I chose nutrition specific modules which have been essential to my role, I found the wider variety of study options my course provided has been highly beneficial also – these included anatomy and physiology; horse health and

exercise physiology. Having to create and deliver presentations as part of some of the modules was also very helpful as this is now quite a large part of my job. The discipline; time management/priority of work and; research skills that a degree requires has undoubtedly helped me in my career also.

Future Plans

Research continues in the many aspects of equine nutrition and we are lucky enough to attend regular conferences that keep us up-to-date with the many progressions that occur. I hope to continue in my role developing in experience and expertise.

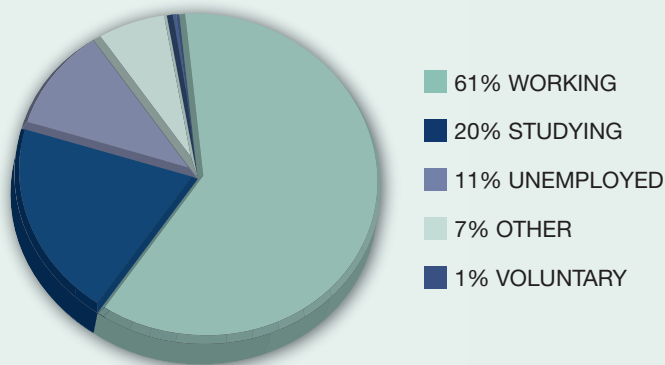
Future Plans
