

Student Finance Update

Student Finance has been in the news considerably over the past few months, with many aspects of the changes in 2012 still to be confirmed. HEIs in the Anglia region will be updating their websites as the detail of the change is confirmed, and prospective students and their advisors are welcome to discuss finance 2012 directly with HELOA members. The key confirmed points are:

- Students applying for 2011 entry will face a maximum tuition fee of £3,375 per year, and will be able to apply for a tuition fee loan for this amount. Any changes to tuition fees for 2012 will not affect students who started their course in 2011.
- Students deferring entry to 2012, or applying for 2012 entry, will be affected by the planned changes to student finance.
- From 2012, universities will be able to charge a tuition fee of £6000, increasing to £9000 per year in exceptional cases.



- The income threshold for maintenance grants is expected to decrease, so students from households with incomes above £42,000 will have living support provided entirely from the student loan.
- Universities will no longer be required to provide a bursary for students receiving the full maintenance grant. Some universities may still offer financial support, with information on their websites.
- Graduates will begin to repay their tuition and maintenance loans upon earning a salary of £21,000 or more. The repayment period will extend to 30 years, and graduates will repay 9% of what they earn above £21,000
- Interest will remain linked to inflation, with additional interest charged to higher earners.

Finance and the Student Experience



Student Finance continues to be one of the most talked-about issues in higher education at the moment, and many students are concerned about the impact of the changes on their student experience. Some of the key messages that students should consider are:

Graduate employment

The current job market is a tough one. However research shows that graduates are more likely to be in a job than those with lower qualifications. On average, a university graduate earns £100,000 more during his or her lifetime – net of tax – than someone who leaves school at 18.

Repayment

Graduates will begin repaying loans from April after graduation, and once they earn over £21,000. On a salary of £25,000, graduates will repay less than £30 per month. Currently graduates begin repayment on a salary of £15,000, meaning that graduates under the new arrangements will have more money in their pocket after loan repayments have been made.

Term-time employment

More students are considering part-time jobs and working during their holidays while studying, to support their term-time living costs. Universities provide guidance and support in finding part-time jobs, including vacation opportunities relevant to future careers.

Enjoying the Student Experience

Students concerned about funding their student experience should contact universities to discuss financial support and bursaries. However, most students work part-time, and any student struggling with budgeting will be surrounded by other students having a similar experience. Universities will provide advice and guidance to students throughout their degree, about all aspects of finance and budgeting.

Aimhigher

Unfortunately, it has been confirmed that Aimhigher funding will end in July 2011. All Anglia group universities currently work with Aimhigher, and HELOA recognises the valuable work that Aimhigher colleagues have done over the years, and the impact that Aimhigher has had for large numbers of students in the Anglia region.

Universities charging more than £6,000 per year for 2012 entry will be expected to commit to an access agreement with the Office for Fair Access (OFFA), which will require them to have programmes to widen participation. Regardless of the tuition fee, all universities currently involved in widening participation activities via Aimhigher are assessing how to continue with these activities. Teachers or advisors are encouraged to contact universities directly to discuss the availability of activities and events relevant to their students.
